Iran goes to polls to elect new president after Raisi killed in helicopter crash


Taiwan elects William Lai president in historic election, angering China








Ipsos Veracity Index






The public expect Labour to rescue public services...

To what extent, if either, do you support or oppose the following policies from the Labour Party's manifesto?






